** **DPS** was legislatively created in 2011-12, merging the former NC Departments of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention, Crime Control and Public Safety and Corrections. My position was “at-will”, and my roles were subsequently reclassified twice after the Department was formed and the new Secretary created a new organizational structure.

OTHER IMPLEMENTATION SCIENCE RELATED PROFESSIONAL EXPERIENCE (DETAILS)

2013 – Ongoing: **Independent Consulting:** Provide advanced organizational leadership, strategic planning, active implementation support, program development/evaluation training and technical assistance to national coalitions/advocacy groups, state level agencies, interdisciplinary teams, and local entities. Activities include assisting with the adoption of evidence supported practices, transforming small/ intermediate/large public management systems toward outcome-focused and cost-beneficial systems of care. Careful attention is paid to the emerging literatures, implementation drivers and practice models that facilitate successful adoption and implementation of empirically supported approaches at various levels (state, intermediary, local). Relevant fields of work include behavioral health, juvenile and criminal justice, nonprofit management and sustainability, child welfare, substance use disorders, etc. Co-creation or evolution of trans- or interdisciplinary groups/processes (teams to aid in realignment) is a key focus. Also assist with resource development, fundraising and grant writing. Clients and contracts included: ICF International, American Institutes for Research, Vermont Department of Public Health/Division of Oral Health, University of Vermont School of Medicine, Portland State University/Reclaiming Futures, Coalition for Juvenile Justice (Washington DC), Kate B. Reynolds Charitable Trust, Massachusetts Executive Office of Public Safety and Security, US DOJ-Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (States traveled to and directly assisted included: Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Alabama, Wisconsin, Kentucky, Iowa), and local agencies including Johari Family Services Inc.

2013-2015 **Connections of Cumberland County:** as Interim Executive Director (beyond helping to build the foundation of the agency), also provided training and technical assistance support to the agency (employees, volunteers, advocates and interagency partners) in areas related to reducing the trauma and consequences associated with homelessness (women and children). Evidence supported practices such as enabling access to supported housing, supported employment, goals-based case management systems using System of Care principles were some of the focus areas and theoretical frameworks of the training/technical assistance.

2009-2013 **DJJD-DPS:** In the multiple roles associated with these agencies as they evolved, an extensive part of my activities included directly influencing the agency and its divisions to adopt more evidence supported delivery systems. I provided and/or supported managerial oversight, chief operating officer functions, training and other leadership as well as direct

assistance to the agency and its divisions. Also worked with management staff to develop roles for outside, interdisciplinary consultants to assist with training and technical assistance in the adoption and implementation of evidence supported practices (and programs). Example: we designed, implemented and evaluated the first department-wide strategic plan that required all new contracted services to utilize science-supported evidence based programs and services. This change required resourcing and re-imagining the statewide staff capacity and data systems needed to dynamically and effectively capture scaled EBPs. Also installed an employee engagement process designed to shift internal culture and incentivize employee performance based on work plans that integrated the adoption of results-oriented competencies and evidence supported activities (e.g., training, self-improvement, and modified goals/objectives with specific measurable objectives). Focused on improving the evidence basis for policy and programs statewide as a policy advisor to the Secretary and upper management officials. Additionally, participated in early childhood interagency collaboration (prevention) teams associated with child welfare, early child development, and behavioral health agencies and organizations. Served as DJJDP's representative on the NC Alliance for Evidence Based Practices. Had leadership and implementation responsibility for bringing funding and support for new evidence supported practices to statewide scale such as Reclaiming Futures⁽⁹⁾ (a 6-phase evidence supported community based court partnership involving youth with co-occurring behavioral health and substance use disorders that engage with the juvenile justice system). This involved a partnership with Kate B. Reynolds, The Duke Endowment, NC Governors Crime Commission, Administrative Office of the Courts and various state agency leaders). Also led in the agency-wide movement to adopt a number of evidence-based court services (Motivational Interviewing, Risk/Needs theory, and early stages of what has become a version of "Dosage Probation") – as well as community programs interventions. Under our leadership we funded and continued the next iteration of the Standardized Program Evaluation Protocol © (Lipsey and Howell), and evolved the statewide reporting system (online) to include specific elements mapped back to evidence supported interventions.

1998-2009 CommuniCare (Executive Director): Beyond administrative functions, provided training, technical assistance, capacity building and the focus on accountability relative to programs within the agency, as well as affiliated and contracted services. CommuniCare provides behavioral health, counseling, substance abuse, co-occurring disorder, prevention and juvenile justice / crossover youth services for youth ages 6-19. During these years, Wandersman, Chinman and others were producing the "Getting to Outcomes" framework. This along with the Rand Corp., Packard Foundation, United Way, Community Toolbox and similar frameworks created the evidence bases from which I trained/assisted. I provided strategic leadership, social science translation and implementation guidance along with program evaluation capacity building for CommuniCare as well as other community nonprofit organizations; also conducted applied community-based research to track evidence-supported initiatives. Principally responsible for acquiring external funding for system and program level interventions such as Communities that Care® (CTC), Drug-Free Communities Support, and additional clinical interventions as the agency evolved toward more behavioral health/substance abuse services. We were the first CTC site in the state, scaling up the CTC "operating system" in our county which required redesigning our interdisciplinary, interagency

collaboration practices. We also installed and scaled the first Reclaiming Futures site (along with 5 other counties), moving our court-involved substance abuse services to an evidence supported framework.
