### **OUTCOMES AND ACCOUNTABILITY**

L egislators are no longer satisfied with answers like, "because it's good for kids" as justification for contin ued funding of early childhood programs. Early childhood professionals are challenged to develop accountability strategies that are appropriate for these programs and the young children they serve as well as responsive to the needs of the public for fiscal responsibility.

### KINDERGARTEN READINESS

When legislators and policy makers require that early childhood investments show positive effects, the outcome is often framed as school readiness—do children have better skills when they enter school? North Carolina, like many states, has invested heavily in early childhood initiatives, such as Smart Start and the More at Four prekindergarten program, to improve children's readiness for school. Yet school readiness means more than just children. Current thinking about readiness includes children, families, schools, and communities. North Carolina's official school readiness definition emphasizes both children and schools.

## CHILD SERVICE COORDINATION

M any children and families need services from multiple programs and providers. Conse quently, in recent years the number of federal and state programs designed to help young children with diverse needs in this country has grown dramatically. But how easy is it for a family to learn about these services and access them? Are service providers knowledgeable about services provided by other programs? Lack of coordinated early intervention systems may result in duplication of effort, frustration on the part of the families seeking services, or delays in or lack of services to children. The Infant-Toddler Program, Part C of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, was designed in part to improve child service coordination. Research into the implementation and effectiveness of this Program has shown that most states are using less comprehensive and coordinated models of coordination, and that an integrated approach to providing services yielded a much higher degree of satisfaction and sense of belonging among families in need. In addition, many other programs such as Head Start, Early Start and Smart Start require coordination. Research indicates that developing the linkages, structures and mechanisms to ensure coordination among programs is extremely challenging. Many of these programs use a different coordinating council, which increases the challenge of coordination.

## CHILDREN'S MENTAL HEALTH

M any young children are not developing the emotional and social skills that they will need to succeed in school. Achieving the national goal of school readiness for all children requires paying attention to early social, emotional, and behavioral challenges as well as cognitive and physical development. We need more study of effective mental health interventions for young children and their parents and how these strategies can be built into the infrastructure of community, state, and federal programs.

### **RESEARCH TO PRACTICE TO RESEARCH**

A key goal of research in social and behavioral sciences is the improvement of practice. The extent to which there is a serious gap in the "research to practice loop" in education has been the subject of professional discussion and debate. Some blame the research community for failing to address practical problems in ways that contribute to effective solutions. Others say the problem is that researchers are not committed to disseminating their findings to anyone other than other researchers. Still others blame practitioners and professional development systems, saying that they are not able to see the implications of research and make adequate translations to practice. Most discussants conclude that arguing and casting blame will not solve the problem. They recognize that researchers and those who are the beneficiaries of the research (practitioners, administrators, policy-makers, families) must work together to create solutions to this problem.
