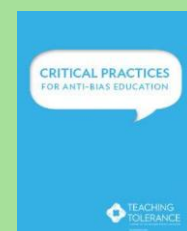

Building the Capacity for Children to Be Curious: Watch, Read, Apply

Recently, a team of researchers from the University of Michigan used data gathered in a nationally representative sample of 6,200 American kids, and found that kids who demonstrated an eagerness to learn new things were more likely to be high achievers in school. Consider the following components as a way to help students think about how to support opportunities for children to develop their curiosity.

1. To set the stage, show Neil deGrasse Tyson's video [Want Scientifically Literate Children? Get Out of Their Way](http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=AIEJpVIZu0&feature=youtu.be)
2. To cement the message, ask students to read [The Key to Fixing Inequality in Education? Teach Kids to be Curious](https://qz.com/1277230/the-key-to-fixing-inequality-in-education-teach-kids-to-be-curious/)
3. Structure an opportunity for students to apply these ideas.
 - Create an online discussion forum in which students discuss: how they might promote curiosity in infants? Toddlers? Preschoolers? Early elementary? Children with disabilities? Children who are dual language learners?
 - Create an assignment in which students need to increase the opportunities for curiosity daily in (for the sake of example) a preschool classroom. List three evidence-based strategies you might use. Give an example of each strategy, including the domains or concepts the example connects to. Include examples of how you would use the strategy to develop the curiosity of children with disabilities or children who are dual language learners.
